FARMS PROTECTED WITH CLEAN OHIO FUNDS

The Board of Fairfield County Commissioners in partnership with the Ohio Department of Agriculture have closed two more agricultural easements. The Beyer family of Richland Township adds another 110 acres of protection along Little Rush Creek through their participation. This brings the total of protected farmland in Richland Township to 1,345 acres.

The Kircher family has the honor of being the first protected farmland in Amanda Township. Their 49.53 acres brings the total protected in partnership with the Commissioners to 3,135 acres.

The total in the county among all partners including USDA and area land trusts comes to 4,015 acres. The Commissioners have an additional 383 acres pending protection. Thanks to

all the conservation minded partners involved to make these easements happen. We estimate at least 31 individuals play a role in making an easement happen from landowners to the State, County Commissioners, Recorder, Auditor, Map Room, Clerks, USDA-NRCS, foresters, farm operators, title companies, banks, attorneys, accountants and an SWCD employee. Thank you all for helping protect our prime and unique farmland for future generations!

MID-WINTER WATERFOWL AND RIVER OTTER SURVEY RESULTS FOR 2018

Despite most water bodies being locked in solid ice due to extended sub-freezing temperatures during the latter half of December, SWCD Wildlife Specialist Tommy Springer and Wildlife Officer Tony Zerkle were able to locate a few patches of open water and observe several thousand ducks and geese while conducting the annual mid-winter waterfowl survey. This survey takes place during the first week of January each year and counts are taken from twelve pre-selected locations around Fairfield County. Total individuals observed from select species were: Canada geese – 2,430; Mallards – 793; Tundra swans – 2; Gadwalls – 38; Redheads (ducks) – 27; Ring-necked duck – 15; Black ducks – 63.

This year marks the third year that Fairfield County has been included in the Division of Wildlife's river otter survey program. There are five survey sites around the county, located where public roads cross streams and rivers near suitable river otter habitat. Sections of Walnut Creek, Rush Creek, Clear Creek, and the Hocking River are all part of this annual survey.

For the second year in a row, river otter activity was confirmed at a site along Walnut Creek in Liberty Township, but no river otter activity has been observed at any of the other sites since the official survey began. Fairfield County residents are encouraged to contact Fairfield SWCD Wildlife Specialist Tommy Springer to report any local river otter sightings.

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
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FAIRFIELD SWCD BOARD OF SUPERVISORS REORGANIZE


